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SGP participates in SIDS -CBA regional workshop



SGP Suriname coordinator participated in the regional SIDS-CBA workshop with the topic "Community Based Adaptation to Climate Change for GEF SGP National Coordiantors" from 6—9 March 2013 in Trinidad and Tobago.

The goal of this workshop Workshop is to bring together existing and new Global Environment Facility Small Grants Programme (GEF SGP) National Coordinators in order to strengthen delivery of the SGP and Small Island Developing States Community Based Adaptation (SIDS CBA) programmes in the Caribbean.

The status for Suriname is that we have been able to utilize one planning grant in 2012 for a project initiative in the plantation of Johanna Margaretha (right bank of the Commewijne river). The grantee was the Stichting Ontwikkeling Marienburg, and the funds were used to conduct a baseline for the vulnerability capacity assessment of Johanna Margaretha, realized by the Red Cross Suriname, see more on page 2.

The aim for 2013 will be to approve 3—4 projects related to climate change adaptation, one for Johanna Margaretha, and possible other project ideas that will focus on youth education related to climate change and adaptations related to agriculture.

NEW SGP Programme Assistant

Arioene Vreedzaam, the new SGP Programme Assistant



As of February 2013, the SGP office has finally expanded, with a new Programme Assistant.

Short bio on our assistant:

I was born in Suriname, but raised in suburban New York City, U.S.A. I am of indigenous descent, in particular of the Karib tribe. I have an undergraduate degree in biology from Kent State University, and a Master's in Anthropology from the same university. I am a biological scientist and my focal research areas are in feeding and behavioral ecology of Neotropical primates. Additionally, I have conducted biodiversity assessments in the various ecosystems of Suriname. I teach part -time at the Advanced Teachers Training Institute (I.O.L.) in Paramaribo in the biology department. Course topics I teach in are molecular genetics, ethology, health and nutrition, and evolution. In my spare time I volunteer with a local NGO aimed at conservation of the Guiana River Dolphin, go birdwatching, and run marathons.

I am very excited to be working for the Small Grants Programme as this gives me a unique opportunity to work with small communities in the area of environmental sciences at a very different level; from the birth of an idea, to project write up, and to the actual project implementation.







SGP Participates in Made in Suriname fair

From 26-30 April 2013, SGP Suriname participated in the Made in Suriname fair, organized at the Chamber of Commerce location.

SGP Suriname participated with different projects: Stichting Agrarische Vrouwen Commewijne (organic agriculture), Stichting Moederhart from Nickerie (safe agriculture, selling chutney and banana chips) and Stichting U Sa Du from the upper Suriname river (agroforestry project, selling dried chilli powder and cassava products (kwak).



SGP supports Vulnerability Capacity Assessment in Johanna Margaretha

On Tuesday 9 April 2013, the Climate and Vulnerability Assessment Report was officially shared with the SGP coordinator and the community of Johanna Margaretha.

Johanna Margaretha is a former Dutch plantation located on the right bank of the Commewijne river, and bordering the Atlantic Ocean in the north. The total number of inhabitants is 460 people, who are mainly dependent on fisheries for their livelihoods. SGP supported the community with a planning grant of USD 2,000 to assess the Climate and Vulnerability Capacity (VCA), which was done by Suriname the Red Cross.

On 9 April, Mrs. U. Satnarain, who supported the Red Cross in the VCA, also gave a brief presentation to the community on the impacts of climate change for Suriname (see picture left). The next step is that Mrs. U. Satnarain will support the community in drafting a project proposal that will be submitted to SGP for further funding. The ideas are to focus on protection of the mangroves, improving fisheries techniques and management, and also to raise awareness on climate change impacts and education for the community. The planning is to have this project proposal ready by October 2013.









SGP at the Peace corps legacy event

Peace Corps is a United States organization that provides trained men and women volunteers to interested countries around the world. Since its founding in 1961, Peace Corps has had more than 200,000 Volunteers serve in 139 countries. Peace Corps Volunteers promote people-to-people contact between Americans and foreign nationals and work with local communities on sustainable projects that promote economic development, education, health, and other key areas that have been identified by the host government as priorities.

Peace Corps was invited to Suriname in 1995 and has had more than 420 Volunteers serve in Suriname with 27 currently in country. Volunteers work within two areas requested by the Ministry of Regional Development: Community Health Education and Community Economic Development. Volunteers are trained and work throughout Suriname, speaking the local languages Sranan Tongo, Aucan, Saramaccan and Dutch.

Volunteers work on a variety of projects in Suriname including water and sanitation, improving access and availability of health education, conducting public awareness campaigns about HIV/AIDS, improving small business development, teaching grant-writing, promoting youth development and giving trainings on project design and management. This has included assistance with many SGP projects from climate-change awareness training and encouraging solar power for interior radio stations to the sustainable use of non-timber forest products.

In July 2013 Peace Corps Suriname will officially close. To celebrate and commemorate 18 years of service and development work, Peace Corps Suriname held a multi-media Legacy Event on 5 April 2013. The Legacy Event included a documentary film and a photography exhibit. The legacy of Peace Corps Suriname will be measured by the tangible projects and work left behind as well as the impact of the cultural and personal exchanges Volunteers and staff have had with the Surinamese people.

SGP Suriname participated in the legacy event on 5 April with a booth, displaying different SGP project related products, as well as providing general SGP information to attendants.

Project Applying traditional Knowledge in achieving green development

This project aims to facilitate and support mainly community members from different SGP projects in the interior to participate at the 3rd Biodiversity Congress organized in Suriname, from 5—8 August 2013. Also, communities from Guyana, Venezuela, Brazil and Columbia will be facilitated. The community members will have the opportunity to showcase their project, that relates to the topic of this congress, as well as to discuss with other regional community members on the challenges of achieving green development.

Project Community bamboo project

The project aims to strengthen the communities of the district of Para and Wanica to produce bamboo related products for income generation. At the same time, awareness will be raised on how to sustainably harvest the bamboo, as well as the importance of forest conservation.

Project Waste management in Commewijne

The project aims to raise awareness in the resort Alkmaar, district Commewijne, on the dumping of waste, as well as initiating campaigns to clean up the different areas by the local communities and to separate waste, such as the PET (plastic) bottles. A cooperation with a local PET bottle collection company will be realized, to collect the plastic bottles, that are exported for recycle purposes.

Project Recycling waste for handicrafts

The project aims to raise awareness in Wageningen on the re-use of plastic bags, for example to crochet and make plastic bags, that are being sold. The women therefore can earn an income, and spread the message to re-use plastic bags, that are a burden for the environment.

SGP prepares for Knowledge fair

- 3. To publicize SGP's approach, whereby local communities/ organizations take ownership in capacity building and the fight against poverty, through one of SGP's focal areas.
- 4. to create a network of all organizations that are currently implementing projects and those that have already completed. This network will serve to promote and facilitate communication between SGP grantees. This will create a dynamic process of exchange of ideas, knowledge, information, and experience between the grantees, and also increase communication with the SGP office and the National Steering Committee of SGP in Suriname.
