As the largest and longest standing corporate programme of the GEF, SGP provides direct financial and technical support to civil society and community-based organizations, driving local initiatives that address global environmental issues.

For over three decades, we have empowered local communities to address the ongoing planetary crises—from biodiversity loss and climate change to land degradation and pollution—while improving livelihoods and building resilience. By connecting thousands of grassroots efforts from around the world into a strategic, integrated global portfolio through SGP, UNDP ensures that community solutions can be replicated and scaled, highlighting the power of local action to create global impact.

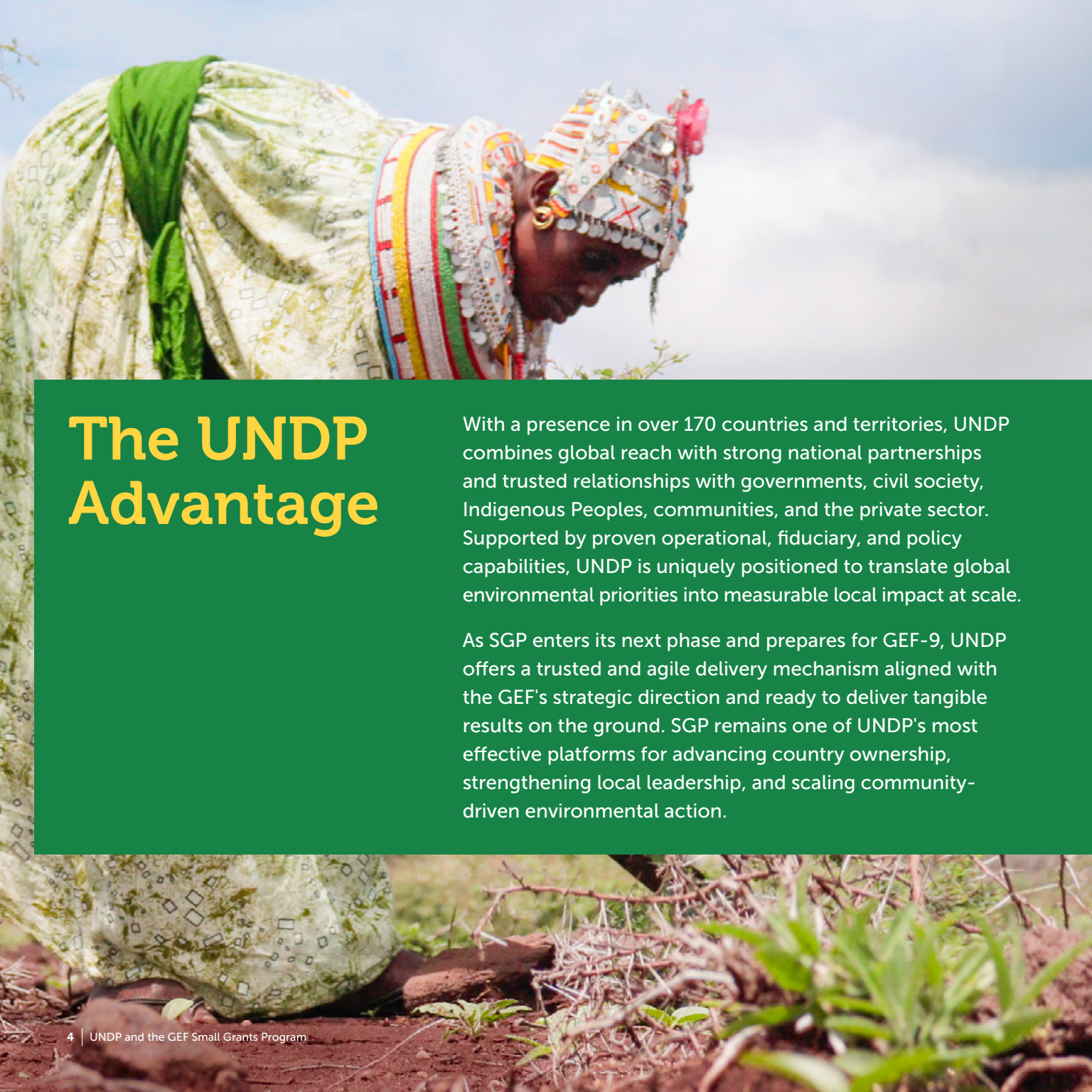

The UNDP Advantage

With a presence in over 170 countries and territories, UNDP combines global reach with strong national partnerships and trusted relationships with governments, civil society, Indigenous Peoples, communities, and the private sector. Supported by proven operational, fiduciary, and policy capabilities, UNDP is uniquely positioned to translate global environmental priorities into measurable local impact at scale.

As SGP enters its next phase and prepares for GEF-9, UNDP offers a trusted and agile delivery mechanism aligned with the GEF's strategic direction and ready to deliver tangible results on the ground. SGP remains one of UNDP's most effective platforms for advancing country ownership, strengthening local leadership, and scaling community-driven environmental action.

Our Core Strengths:



Country-Owned Governance and Social Inclusion

Our model is built on the **National Steering Committee (NSC)**—a decentralized governance mechanism in each country where UNDP implements SGP, composed of representatives from civil society organizations (CSOs), Indigenous Peoples groups, academia, and the private sector. This ensures every project is technically sound, context-specific, and aligned with local priorities. With 90 percent of NSCs featuring gender focal points and nearly half including Indigenous Peoples focal points, we guarantee marginalized groups drive decision-making. This makes UNDP the ideal partner to help the GEF meet its ambitious new target of directing 20 percent of financing to Indigenous Peoples and local communities.



Seamless Policy Integration and GEF-9 Alignment

As the UN's lead development agency, UNDP bridges the gap between local action and national policy. By implementing SGP through an **integrated landscape and seascape approach**, we connect grassroots initiatives directly to countries' core climate and environmental commitments, including Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and National Biodiversity Strategies and Action Plans (NBSAPs). This strategy tackles interconnected environmental challenges—such as sustainable agriculture, ecosystem restoration, and low-carbon energy access—directly supporting GEF-9 Integrated Programs. Moreover, it ensures that community-led innovations not only inform national policies but also delivers the multi-benefit solutions.



Catalyzing Global Partnerships

Backed by an active presence in 170 countries and territories, UNDP provides a resilient operational backbone that connects environmental initiatives to broader development goals, such as poverty reduction, democratic governance, and crisis resilience. Beyond funding, we offer a comprehensive support system focused on **capacity building, knowledge sharing, and partnership brokering**. By leveraging long-standing relationships with governments, academia, and the private sector, we connect SGP grantee-partners to a global network of experts and policy advisors. This structure fosters strategic alliances, unlocks critical co-financing, and mobilizes the technical expertise needed to scale local success across GEF-9 focal areas.



A Launchpad for Local Innovation and Scaling

UNDP positions SGP as a **global incubator for locally-led innovation**, providing flexible financing that allows communities to test, refine, and prove new approaches. Rather than just funding isolated projects, we build the pathways to scale grassroots successes into national realities. Serving as a trusted and neutral partner, UNDP convenes and facilitates CSO-Government-Private Sector Dialogue Platforms, which enable CSOs and communities to engage directly with national governments, private sector and other partners to build and strengthen relationships, influence national policy and unlock new resources.

Geographic Coverage



SGP has historically supported a total of **136 countries**, while it is currently active in 122 countries in Operational Phase 8 with UNDP. This includes 32 Small Island Developing States (SIDS) and 42 Least Developing Countries (LDCs).

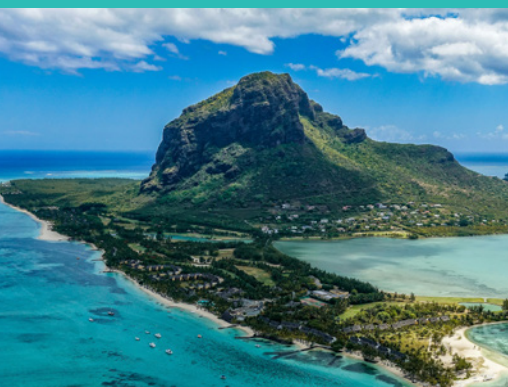

Sustainable agriculture and fisheries, and food security



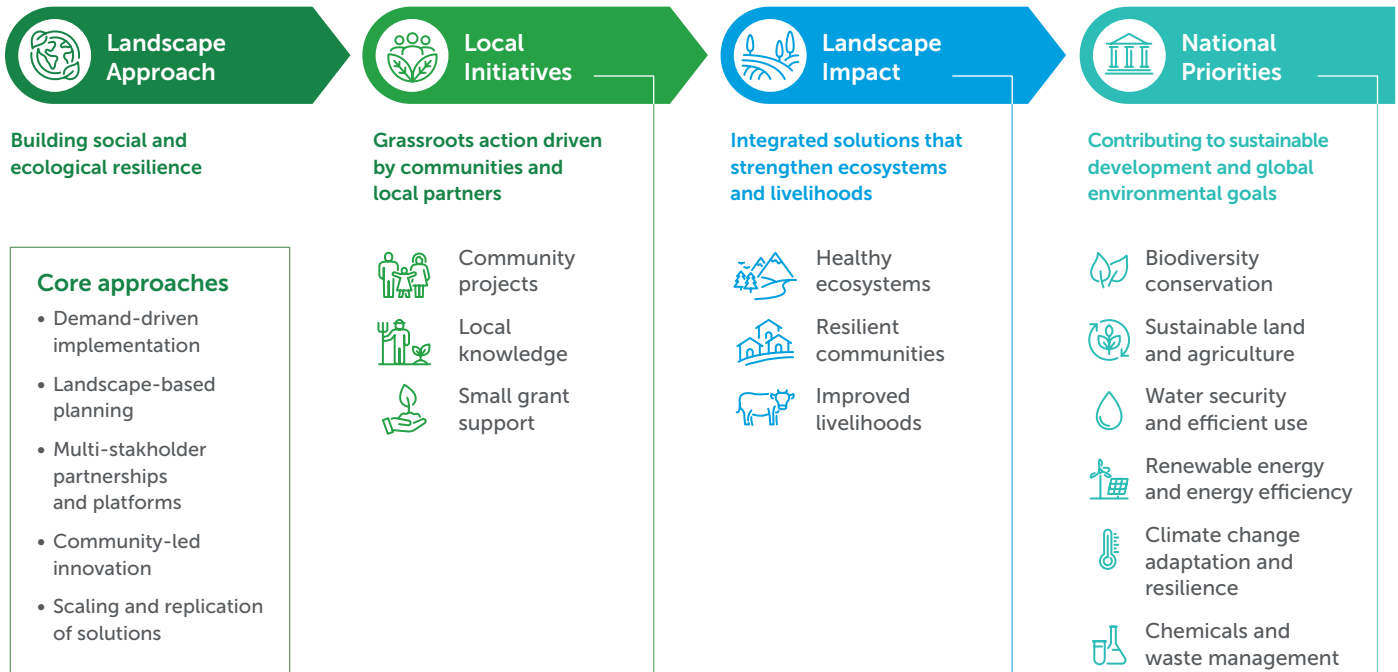
