Foreword by the Resident Representative

The year 2024 marked a decisive milestone in our collective drive toward a more prosperous and resilient Cameroon. In partnership with the Government of Cameroon and our development partners, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) sustained its efforts to respond to the major development challenges outlined in the National Development Strategy 30 (SND30). The transformational dynamic we are engaged in, alongside public authorities, aims to strengthen growth so that it becomes more inclusive and prosperity-driven, while enhancing governance, reinforcing social cohesion, and addressing climate change.

As part of our commitment to inclusive and transformative growth, we have supported over 300 small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) and startups, led by women and young people, by providing them with various forms of assistance to help increase their production capacity. Significant progress has also been made in the area of governance, with a strong emphasis on accelerating the decentralization process. This includes the adoption of the first Local Development Index (LDI), and the establishment of a Geographic Information System (GIS) covering all 374 municipalities. These tools are instrumental for better public policy planning and for ensuring more transparent resource management at the local level.

Improving people's access to quality services is also a priority for UNDP, which, through digitalization initiatives, contributes to the modernization of public services. Security challenges remain a serious concern, particularly in the North-West, South-West, and Far North regions, where more than one million people are displaced. Through the Presidential Plan for Reconstruction and Development (PPRD) and the Regional Stabilization Facility, UNDP has supported the construction and rehabilitation of more than 134 social and economic infrastructures, ensuring better access to basic social services and creating economic opportunities that are essential for stability and peace.

Climate change continues to severely impact Cameroon. UNDP is supporting the country's commitment to reduce its carbon footprint by 35% by 2030 through the promotion of adaptation and mitigation initiatives, such as mobilizing green finance and integrating renewable energy solutions. In this context, we supported the development of a sustainable financing framework (ESG framework) in collaboration with the Ministry of Finance.

Integrating gender issues remains a core focus for UNDP and its partners and is recognized as a crucial driver of sustainable development. UNDP is committed to leaving no one behind by empowering women, youth, and vulnerable populations, and by ensuring that all interventions are fully inclusive.

In this pivotal year, we would like to express our sincere gratitude to the Government of Cameroon, to the United Nations agencies, and to all our partners for their continued trust and collaboration. The results presented in this report reflect our collective determination to build a better future for Cameroon. With your strategic and financial support, we have been able to scale up our efforts towards a more prosperous, inclusive, and resilient Cameroon.

Before concluding, I must express my deepest gratitude to our staff for the engaging implementation of our programmes, often within considerable challenging situations. Thank you for your courage, commitment, and service. UNDP is proud to count you among its team. Together, let us continue our work to improve lives and build a stronger future for the people of Cameroon.

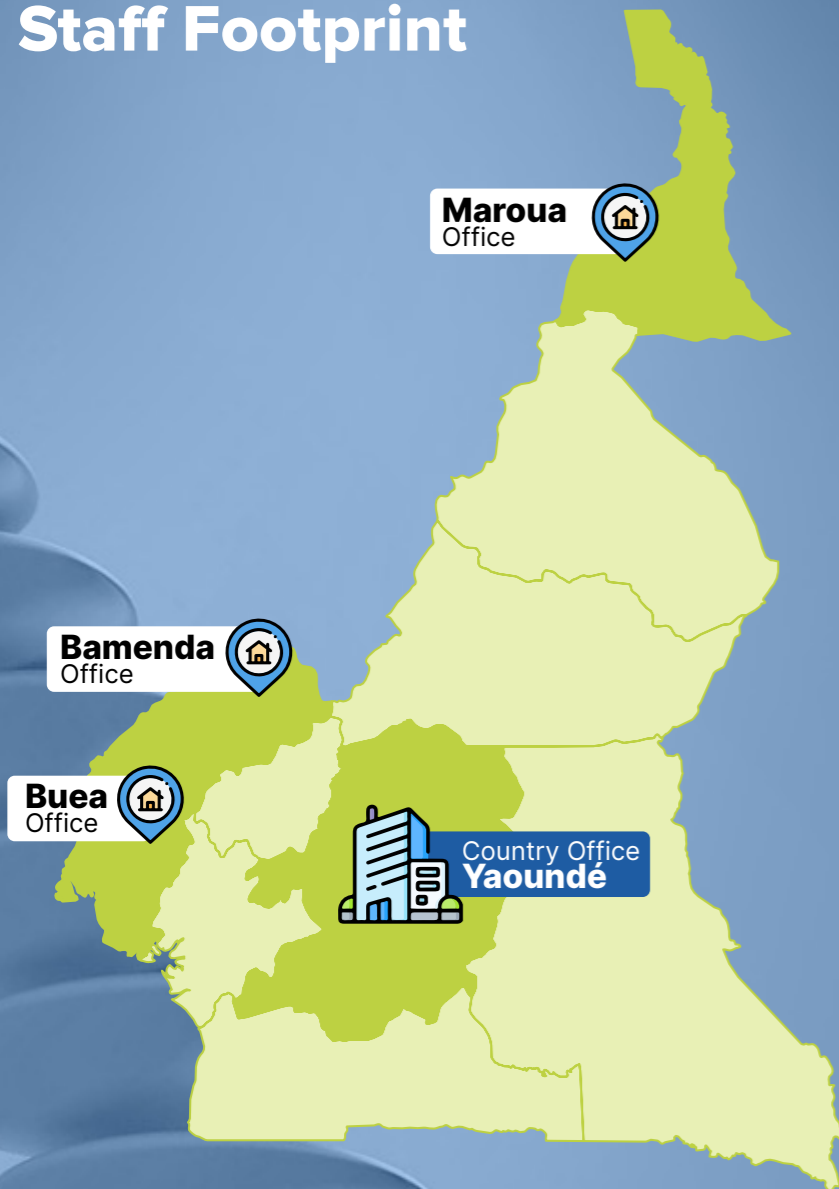

OPERATIONAL CONTEXT : The Need for Synergies Amid Persistent Development Challenges

Cameroon, like many developing countries, faces a multitude of complex and interconnected challenges that hinder its progress toward inclusive and sustainable development. These challenges—including persistent poverty and inequality—have been exacerbated by the multiple crises characterizing the current context. Despite moderate economic growth (4% on average during the post-COVID-19 period), poverty remains high, affecting approximately 37.7% of the population. Social and economic inequalities persist, with significant disparities between urban and rural regions. The North-West, South-West, and Far North regions are particularly affected by armed conflict and violence, resulting in mass displacement and chronic instability. Cameroon is vulnerable to the impacts of climate change, such as floods, droughts, and land degradation. These phenomena worsen living conditions in rural areas and undermine efforts aimed at the positive socioeconomic transformation of society.

Furthermore, the financial resources allocated to interventions are often limited and insufficient to address the scale of development challenges. In this context, and considering these challenges, it is imperative to create synergies at both strategic and operational levels among development actors to maximize the impact of interventions and ensure the inclusive and sustainable development of communities. Aligning initiatives will help to maximize impact, strengthen local technical capacities, and promote innovation and mutual learning. It also supports the development of partnerships and more effective dialogue among stakeholders.

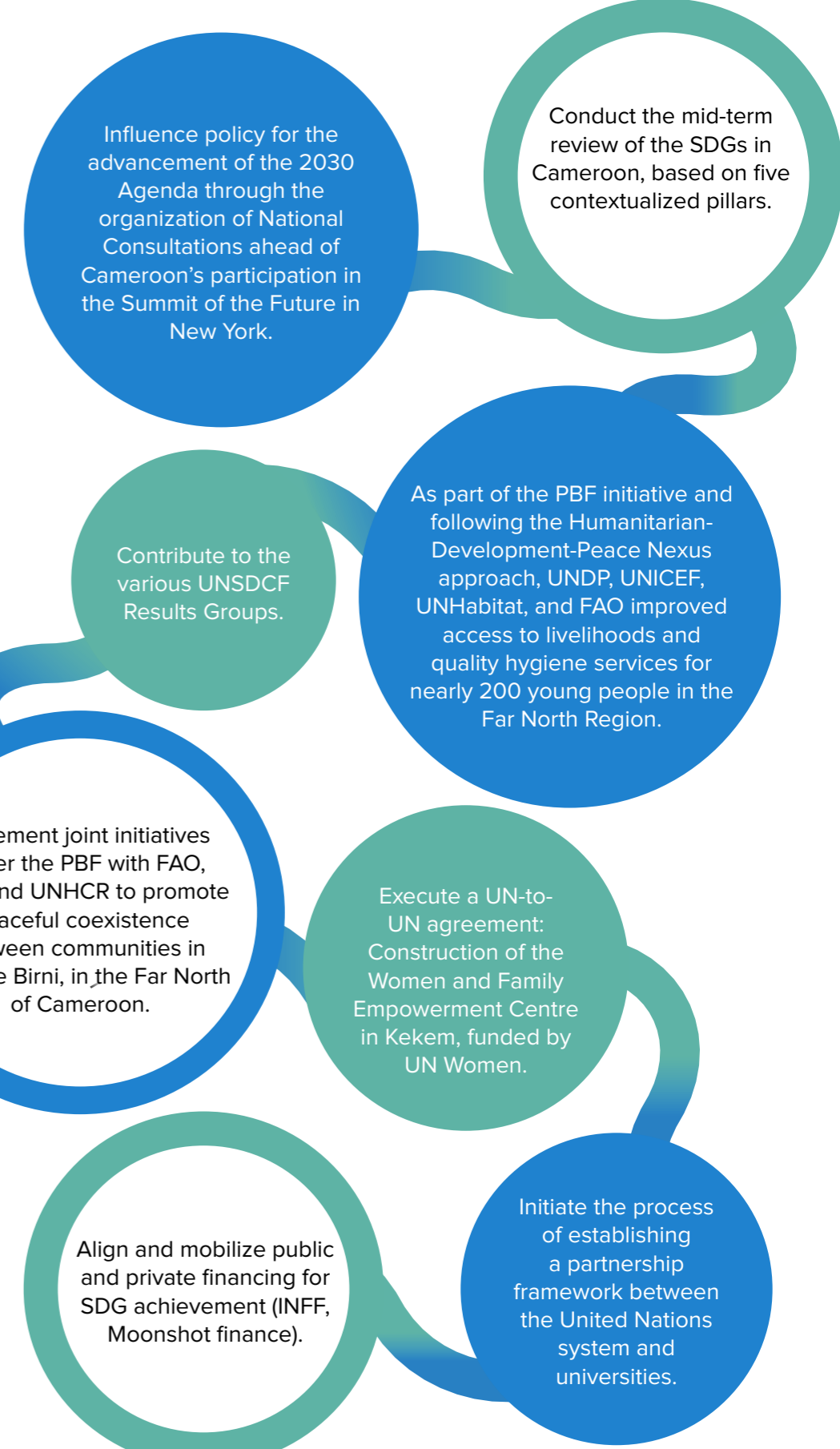

Interventions focus on improving value chains, access to finance and technology, and regional and continental integration. UNDP prioritizes micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs), common initiative groups (GICs), and cooperatives as key drivers of sustainable and transformative inclusive growth, recognizing their crucial role in the national economic fabric. UNDP will continue to support SMEs and start-ups by facilitating access to financing and expanding opportunities at the sub-regional and continental levels to accelerate Cameroon's economic transformation.

KEY RESULTS

CAPACITY BUILDING FOR VALUE CHAIN DEVELOPMENT AND JOB CREATION

ACCESS TO REGIONAL AND CONTINENTAL MARKETS FOR SMES, MICROENTERPRISES, COMMON INITIATIVE GROUPS, AND COOPERATIVES

Improving access to regional and continental markets remains a priority for the Government of Cameroon. In this regard, UNDP's interventions focus on strengthening the export capacities of SMEs and national institutions to support greater regional and continental integration within the framework of the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA- known in French as ZLECAF):

MINPMEESA

Institutional support has been provided to the Ministry of Small and Medium-sized Enterprises, Social Economy, and Handicrafts (MINPMEESA) for training cassava cooperatives within the AfCFTA framework.

CASSAVA PROCESSING COOPERATIVES

Support has also been extended to cassava processing cooperatives in several localities, including Mbangassina, Awae, Pouma, Mbalmayo, Doumé, Kyé-Ossi, and Mbankomo.

SUCCESS STORY

Alima's Clay-Based Soap Initiative: Turning Inherited Skills into Sustainable Entrepreneurship

Alima Pemboura, Alima Pemboura is a 35-year-old artisan from Fouban and mother of seven children. She turned a traditional skill passed down from her grandparents — using clay as a cleaning agent — into a local soap-making business. Her community liked the product, but Alima faced serious challenges: she had little money, could only produce small quantities, and struggled to sell her soap.

"We had a good market opportunity, but we lacked the tools and funding to improve the quality and quantity of our soap and reach more customers," she explained. The turning point came with support from the ACP-EU Development Minerals Programme, implemented by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). With this support, Alima was able to officially register her business under the name YMCA-OR SARL. "The project helped us move from an association to a registered company by supporting us in getting a business license," she said proudly.

Together with her team, Alima received business training at the University of Dschang. The training covered entrepreneurship, market analysis, marketing, and business management. The programme also gave her access to a grant. This helped her buy raw materials, create new products like shower gel, hair soap, and detergents, and expand her market.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the project provided protective equipment, allowing her business to keep running safely.

"At the end of the training, the project gave us production equipment and set up meetings with mining development institutions. This helped us launch new products and build a distribution network," Alima shared. Today, her business has 12 employees and several sales agents. Her products are now sold in big cities like Yaoundé, Douala, and Ebolowa.

"The project's support increased both the quality and the quantity of our products, and that has boosted our sales," she said.

As Dr. Charlot Moussa, National Coordinator of the programme, explained: "The programme helped identify the needs of the mining sector and supported many actors in Cameroon. But big challenges remain, such as access to finance and modern equipment."

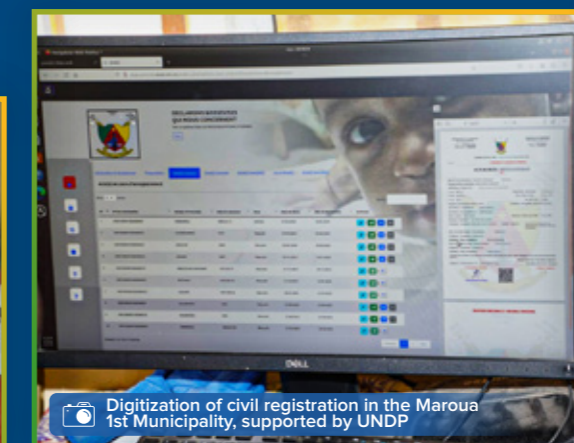

In 2024, UNDP continued its efforts to build the capacity of the National Statistical and Planning Information System so it can provide high-quality data and analysis to support planning, implementation, coordination, monitoring, and evaluation of development policies and decision-making.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON CENTRAL AFRICAN INTEGRATION

was organized in partnership with the University of Yaoundé II.

ECONOMIC COMMUNITY OF CENTRAL AFRICAN STATES (ECCAS) REPORT

SUCCESS STORY

Access to Quality Healthcare Services in the Buea Town Community (Buea, South-West Region)

The Buea Town Integrated Health Centre, in the South-West Region of Cameroon which serves over 15,000 residents of the town, was in a critical state before the intervention of the Presidential Plan for Reconstruction and Development (PPRD) of the North West and South West regions. Mrs. Mokwe Marie, the Chief of Post of the Centre, described the situation as follows: **“We faced major challenges in hygiene and sanitation due to the lack of water. The building had no lighting at night, and electricity was unstable.”** The center also lacked essential medical equipment, had an under-equipped maternity ward, and no fence for proper security.

Thanks to funding from the Government of Japan under the PPRD-NW/SW, the centre was fully rehabilitated. The work included the complete renovation of the building, the establishment of new medical services (maternity, pediatrics, minor surgery), installation of a solar energy system, provision of a potable water point, and construction of a fence with a security post.

The impact of the intervention was immediate. **“We now have a clean and secure environment to treat our patients. This has improved service quality and increased attendance by over 50%,”** Mrs. Mokwe happily reported. Beneficiaries have also felt the change. **“Before, I was worried about coming here. The building was unwelcoming, and there was barely any water or light. Today, I feel safe, and the care is much better,”** said Mrs. Martha Ngome, a young mother who gave birth at the centre.

In addition to Buea, eight other health centres were rehabilitated in the Fako Division, along with eleven water points, some powered by solar energy. **“Thanks to a strong partnership between the governments of Cameroon and Japan, UNDP, and other actors, we’ve met urgent needs. But many communities still need support,”** emphasized Ahmed Ndjama Abouem, National Coordinator of the programme.



Promoting Peace and Social Cohesion

The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), in partnership with the Government of Cameroon, has taken key steps to strengthen peace, social cohesion, and security in areas affected by conflict. Through major initiatives like the Presidential Plan for the Reconstruction and Development of the North-West and South-West Regions (PPRD-NW/SW) and the Regional Stabilization Facility (Cameroon), UNDP is helping to rebuild the presence of the state, improve community harmony, and support economic recovery for people affected by security crises.

SUCCESS STORY

Saved from Ruins: The Resilient Journey of Mr. Mahama Pekuelef (Mozogo, Extreme North Region, Cameroon)

In Mozogo, a town deeply marked by the Boko Haram crisis, 32-year-old **Mahama Pekuelef** embodies resilience. Once a prosperous trader, he lost everything due to the situation. Reduced to selling a few products by the roadside, he recalls: **“I carried the weight of the world on my shoulders.”**

However, everything changed two years ago, thanks to the interventions of the Regional Stabilization Facility (Cameroon Window). Mahama received a shop with solar panels in the market. This secured space now protects his products, preventing heavy losses. **“I never thought such assistance could make such a big difference,”** he confides. With solar light, his refrigerator operates, and his income skyrockets, rising from 200,000 FCFA to 1,700,000 FCFA. No longer having to transport his goods every day allows him to expand his stock. Married to three women and a father of eight children, Mahama expresses the impact of this transformation: **“I can now provide for my family.”**

The revival of commerce, livelihood along with the construction of infrastructure such as schools and health centres, is bringing life back to Mozogo. Mahama now dreams of a better future for his children: **“I want them to become doctors, teachers, leaders.”** Mahama’s story illustrates the collective strength of the community and the importance of targeted support actions. UNDP, along with its partners, is committed to extending these opportunities to other vulnerable families for a brighter future.

The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) is working with the Government of Cameroon to fight climate change. This includes actions at both the national and community levels to build strong institutions, help communities become more resilient, and support new and smart solutions to reduce and adapt to the effects of climate change. Through a strategic partnership between UNDP, Cameroonian institutions, and the financial sector, the programme is promoting long-term climate solutions and helping Cameroon raise funds for its green transition.

KEY RESULTS

BUILDING CAPACITY TO ACCESS CLIMATE FINANCE

Getting funds to fight climate change is a big challenge for the Government of Cameroon. UNDP is helping by training stakeholders and key institutions to take advantage of the opportunities offered by climate finance.

CLIMATE FINANCE

Staff from various government ministries were trained on climate finance.

SUSTAINABLE FINANCING FRAMEWORK

Together with the Ministry of Finance (MINFI) and CITI Bank, UNDP helped develop a Sustainable Financing Framework (also called the ESG framework), which was approved by the Prime Minister to help raise climate funds.

GREEN, BLUE, AND SOCIAL BONDS

Plans were made to issue green, blue, and social bonds to finance climate-related projects.

SUCCESS STORY

From Bee Stings to Big Wins: How Beekeeping is Helping Communities Reduce Human-Elephant Conflict in Cameroon

The Campo Ma'an National Park, located in the South Region of Cameroon, is a sanctuary for forest elephants, gorillas, and chimpanzees. However, for the nearby communities, living alongside wildlife hasn't always been harmonious. For several years now, elephants have been regularly invading fields, destroying crops, threatening livelihoods, and heightening tensions between people and nature. To respond to this situation, the Community Association for Sustainable Development (CASuDev) launched an innovative beekeeping initiative to ease these conflicts while offering sustainable income opportunities to local residents. With support from the Global Environment Facility (GEF) Small Grants Programme (SGP) and UNDP, CASuDev implemented this community beekeeping project to address the growing conflict between humans and elephants.

As surprising as it may seem, elephants are afraid of bees. The buzzing of these insects poses a painful threat to their sensitive ears and trunks. By placing beehives along the edges of their fields, farmers create a natural barrier that keeps elephants away while generating new sources of income.

"The beehives changed everything," says Mr. Yuth Martin, a farmer from one of the participating communities. **"Before, we lived in fear of losing our harvest overnight. Today, the elephants stay away, and we earn money from the honey. It's a win-win for our families and the park."**

The project has trained dozens of farmers in modern beekeeping techniques—from hive maintenance and honey harvesting to pest control. CASuDev and UNDP provided starter kits including hives and protective equipment and supported the establishment of community apiaries. Ongoing technical support is provided through follow-up visits and mentoring to ensure that skills and benefits are sustained.

Since the project's launch, communities have noticed a clear reduction in crop damage caused by elephants. At the same time, local honey production has experienced a real boost.

"Now that the elephants are no longer destroying our crops, life is more peaceful. We sell the honey at the local market and use the money to pay school fees and support our families. This project has given us more than just protection—it has restored our dignity and hope for a better future," adds Mr. Yuth Martin.

This initiative has also strengthened community involvement in conservation. As conflicts decrease, residents are gaining a new appreciation for the park's ecological value. Those who once saw wildlife as a threat are now actively taking part in its protection, proving that coexistence is not only possible—it's also beneficial.

Mid-Term Review of the 2022–2026 CPD :

Optimizing Strategies for More Sustainable Results

As part of the implementation of the 2022–2026 Country Programme Document (CPD), a mid-term review was conducted to assess the progress made, identify lessons learned, and propose strategic adjustments for the remainder of the cycle. The review took place in Douala in December 2024, under the leadership of the Ministry of Economy, Planning and Regional Development (MINEPAT), and was carried out in a participatory manner with the active involvement of sectoral ministries and other partners.

The main objective of this mid-term review was to take stock of progress made halfway through the CPD implementation, identify best practices, challenges encountered, and opportunities, to adjust priorities and enhance the effectiveness of interventions for the rest of the cycle. The review also aimed to ensure that interventions remain aligned with national priorities and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The main recommendations stemming from this review are presented on two levels. At the strategic level, the review proposes diversifying funding sources, strengthening intersectoral coordination, systematically integrating environmental and social assessments, and embedding climate considerations more firmly in public policies. At the operational level, recommendations include accelerating the implementation of climate-related priorities, revising indicators, adopting more inclusive approaches for vulnerable groups, and strengthening human resources dedicated to monitoring and evaluation. In addition, this review has helped outline the broad lines of a strategic repositioning of the CPD, aimed at more targeted, inclusive, and high-impact action.

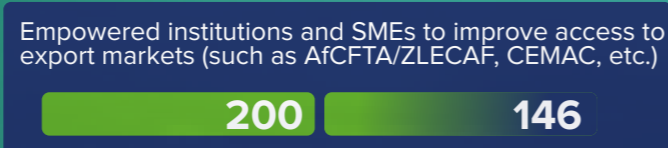
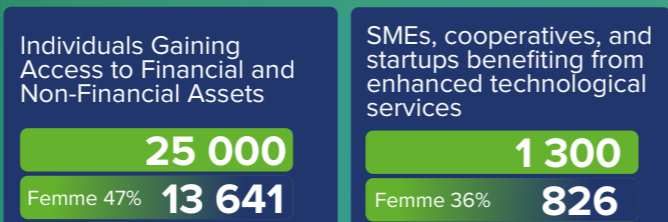

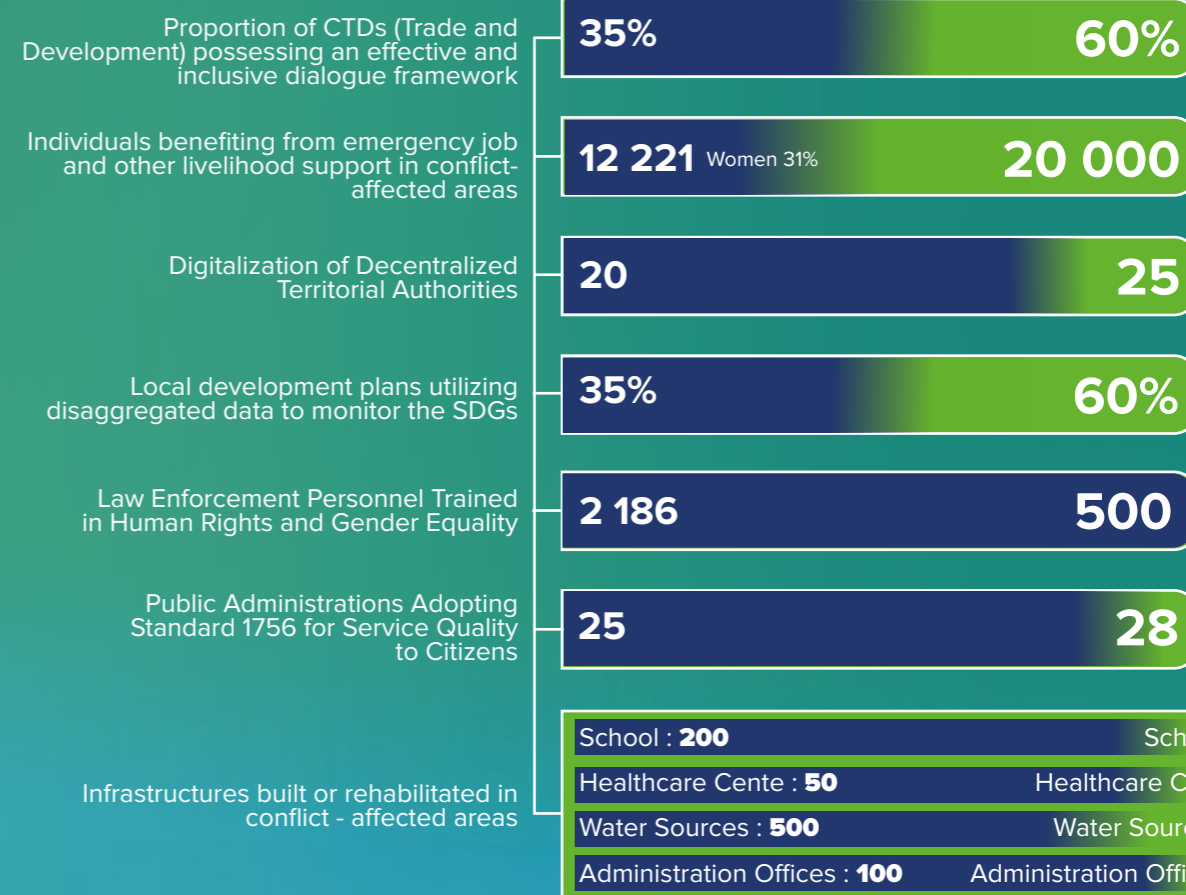

Toward More Inclusive Change

After earning the bronze medal under the “Seal for Gender Equality,” UNDP Cameroon aims to strengthen its efforts to further reduce gender inequalities and position itself among the top offices that mainstream gender in their operations and Programmes.

Given the unequal access to employment opportunities between men and women, UNDP prioritizes women in its empowerment activities. Nearly 600 people, 43% of whom are women, have been supported to strengthen value chains, access digital technologies, and secure funding sources. The goal is to equip women to better seize economic opportunities.

Efforts toward inclusive governance have helped increase women’s participation in decision-making processes. In the context of accelerating decentralization, the guide for developing Communal Development Plans (PCD) places significant emphasis on integrating gender equality actions in local development. It includes women’s access to basic social services, prevention of gender-based violence, and promotion of civic participation.

At the local level, women’s associations are the most active in fostering social cohesion. In conflict-affected areas, women’s leadership is promoted in community dialogues aligned with the national action plan of Resolution 1325.

In the Far North region, thanks to UNDP and partner interventions, women’s status is gradually changing: their representation in justice and decision-making bodies is becoming more accepted. Some local chiefdoms are now even governed by women.

Infrastructure projects supported by UNDP have included specific consultations with women to identify their needs, ensuring basic social infrastructure like schools and health centers are accessible and safe. Management committees, including women, have been formed to maintain these infrastructures, strengthening their role in decision-making.

Regarding the training of security forces and local actors on human rights and gender inequality, more work remains. Out of 572 people trained, only 5% were women. However, these trainings aimed to promote human rights and combat gender-based violence, turning many male participants into allies for women’s promotion and protection in these contexts.

Women experts facilitated the workshops, enhancing female representation and encouraging community engagement. This approach has improved the capacity of Defense and Security Forces to address women’s specific needs, especially in conflict zones, contributing to a safer, more inclusive environment that supports gender equality.

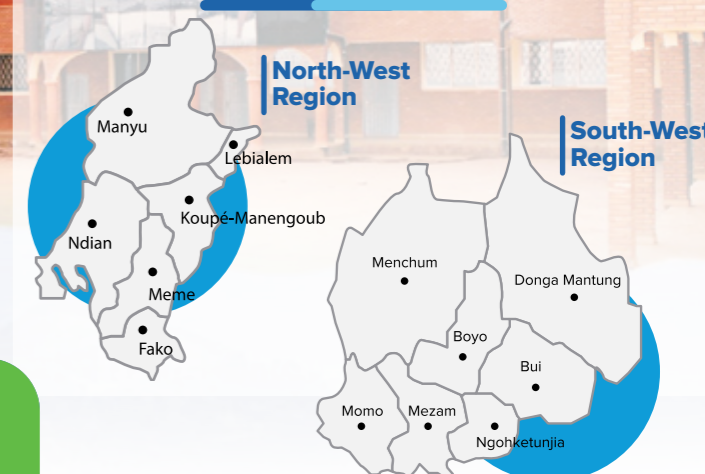

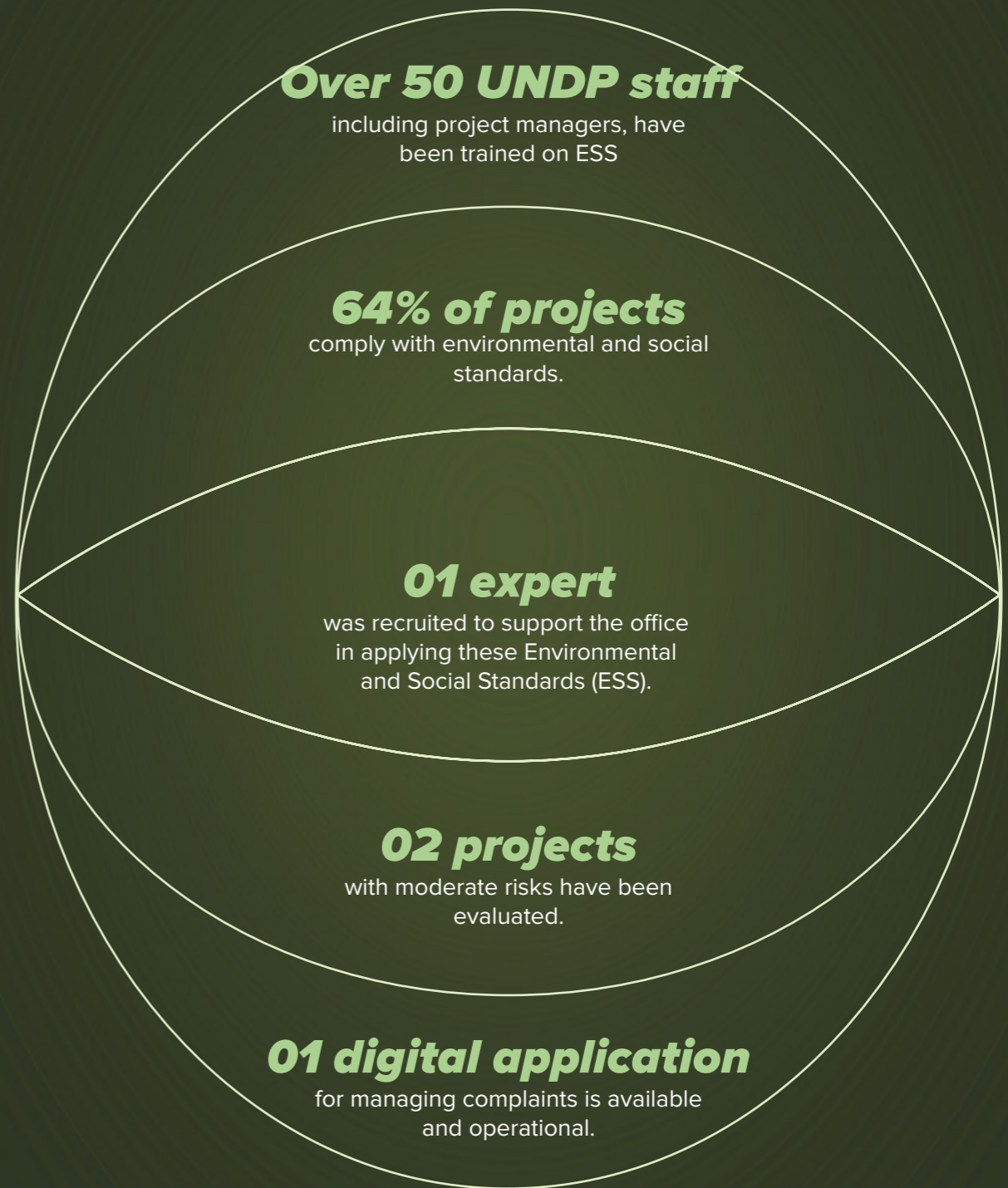

Environmental and Social Safeguards

Committing to Sustainable Performance

Environmental and social safeguards were introduced at the Country Office in December 2023 to align with the momentum driven at the corporate level. This approach aims to promote high-quality projects and Programmes by ensuring sustainability from both environmental and social perspectives. These safeguards make sure that UNDP's activities do not cause harm to the environment or society, and that measures are in place to minimize risks.



Looking Ahead to 2025

In a context marked by increasing resource scarcity, global economic instability, and internal budget pressures, mobilizing funding becomes a strategic imperative for UNDP Cameroon. In 2025, UNDP will adopt an innovative and integrated approach to development financing. It will strengthen government capacities to mobilize domestic resources. At the same time, partnerships with the private sector will be developed to catalyze impact investments. Opportunities offered by climate finance will also be explored, and collaborations with international financial institutions will be reinforced.

Resource Mobilization: A Strategic Priority for 2025.

The responsible use of technologies, especially artificial intelligence (AI), is critical. UNDP must equip itself to make the best use of these tools to enhance the effectiveness of its interventions. It will also need to manage the impacts of these technologies on sustainable development, ensuring effective governance to maximize benefits while minimizing risks.

Emerging Technologies.

Building community resilience to crises and uncertainties is essential. In 2025, UNDP will strengthen community resilience by integrating climate adaptation into peace strategies. Crisis prevention will be further analyzed through the lens of the Peace-Climate Nexus.

Strengthening Peace-Climate Nexus Initiatives.

Prevent and Protect: Towards an Integrated Response to Gender-Based Violence (GBV) in Cameroon.

In 2025, UNDP will intensify efforts to eliminate gender-based violence. Recent data shows that 54.6% of Cameroonian women aged 15 and above have experienced various forms of violence. To create safe and inclusive environments, UNDP will ramp up awareness campaigns in collaboration with the government, civil society, and other partners to prevent violence and protect survivors.

Preparing the New Country Programme Document (CPD)

The year 2025 marks an important milestone in preparing the next cycle of cooperation with the Government of Cameroon. The evaluation of the cooperation framework (UNSDCF) and the current CPD are key steps that will help build a project document that takes into account achievements, gaps, and dynamics in economic growth, governance, and climate change.
